

Questions & Answers For Catholics

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One of the best ways to learn is to ask questions. Interestingly, the most significant summary of our Catholic faith was written by St. Thomas Aquinas (called the *Summa Theologica* – Summary of Theology) and is set up in a question-and-answer format. It's hard to believe an answer if you don't understand the question it is addressing. The Q&A below is no *Summa Theologica*, but hopefully some of these reflections will answer questions that are important to you.

Q. My grandfather was telling us about things he liked about Mass when he was a kid. He said some churches still offer it the old way and priests say it in Latin. Why don't we have that at all our parishes?

A. Your question is a very good one. It's a question that has had a lot of discussion. Allow me to offer some background and then some thoughts.

First of all, I think it is important to point out that the Traditional Latin Mass has been celebrated by our Church for over a millennium. This is actually the way that most of the great saints celebrated and attended Mass. St. Francis and Saint Clare, St. Thomas Aquinas, St. Therese of Lisieux and countless other saints celebrated the Mass this way every day of their lives. Furthermore, this way of celebrating the Mass was most likely celebrated by your grandparents and great grandparents. And whenever you read a book about the Mass that is more than 40 years old, it is the Traditional Latin Mass that is being spoken of. So this way of celebrating the Mass is definitely an important part of our Church's history.

In the late 1960's, the pope decided to change the traditional way we celebrate the Mass. Just after Vatican II, the pope, and many others who assisted him, came up with the new Mass that we celebrate in most churches today. By "new" I simply mean that the way in which we celebrate it was changed. It is still the Mass but just in a different form. Then, when the Mass was given a new form, there was also a permission given to celebrate it in the vernacular. This means that the new Mass began to be translated into the many different languages of the world. I believe the hope was that people would better understand what was being said and could participate more fully.

One unfortunate side effect of these new changes was that many began to see the old celebration of the Mass as something forbidden and inappropriate. This was never the intention of the Church. Therefore, more recently, both Pope John Paul II and Pope Benedict XVI reminded us of the great value of the old way of celebrating the Mass.

Pope Benedict went so far as to give permission to every priest to celebrate it in private and, in some cases, in public. He mentioned two reasons he did this. First, he said that "a good number of people remained strongly attached to this usage of the Roman Rite, which had been familiar to them from childhood." And secondly, he said that "it has clearly been demonstrated that young persons too have discovered this liturgical form, felt its attraction and found in it a form of encounter with the Mystery of the Most Holy Eucharist, particularly suited to them."

So the pope saw that during the 40 years after Vatican II we have misunderstood some of the reasons for the new Mass and he wanted to address that. He wants people who are attracted to the Traditional Latin Mass to know that they should not feel as though they are strange or out of touch. Instead, he simply wants everyone to realize that both ways of celebrating the Mass are good and we should all respect each others individual preference.

Now, as for your question about this traditional celebration of the Mass in all parishes. I think that, right now, it's very difficult. Very few priests know Latin well enough to celebrate the Mass that way. Furthermore, most of the laity would have a very hard time attending and following the Mass according to the Traditional Rite. But that doesn't mean it may not happen more often in the future. I am no predictor of the future, but it wouldn't surprise me if, over the next several decades, we see this traditional way of celebrating the Mass become more common. Whether or not it ever comes back to every church every day is something we'll just have to wait and see. But for now, I encourage you to find a church where this form of celebrating the Mass is offered and attend it. It would be a good experience for you. And who knows, you may just like it!

(Automated External Defibrillator)


Through the efforts of

Feast Days and Memorials

Aug 14: St Maximilian Kolbe, 1894-1941 Priest and Martyr

Patron of drug addicts, prisoners, families and the pro-life movement

Raymond Kolbe was a Polish Franciscan priest who was imprisoned in the German death camp at Auschwitz during World War II. He volunteered to die in place of Franciszek Gajowniczek, a man with a family, Fr. Kolbe was killed by lethal injection after two weeks of starvation because the Nazis felt his death was taking too long. He died on August 14, the vigil of Mary's Assumption. The man whose life he saved lived to be 93 and was present in Rome when Pope St. John Paul II canonized St Maximilian Kolbe in 1982.

Aug 16: St Stephen of Hungary, 977-1038, 1st Christian King of Hungary

Patron of bricklayers, stone cutters, and against the death of children

Stephen was born to a pagan family but was baptized at 10 with his father, the Magyar chieftain Geza. He was known as Stephen the Great, a "warrior king", who united the Magyars into a single nation, suppressing revolts by pagan nobles and helping to build churches. Pope Sylvester II anointed him King of Hungary in the year 1000, and he continued to maintain Christianity in the country and region.

Aug 19: St John Eudes, 1601-1680, Priest

Patron of Eudists, the Order of Our Lady of Charity, and missionaries

The son of a farmer in Normandy, France, John was ordained a priest and became a well known preacher and confessor. He volunteered to care for victims of two 17th century plagues and worked as a missionary. He founded a refuge for penitent wayward women, which became the Sisters of Our Lady of Charity of the Refuge. He also founded several seminaries including the Congregation of Jesus and Mary (the Eudists), composed of secular priests dedicated to upgrading the clergy.
