# Questions *and* Answers

One of the best ways to learn is to ask questions. Interestingly, the most significant summary of our Catholic faith was written by St. Thomas Aquinas (called the *Summa Theologica* – Summary of Theology) and is set up in a question-and-answer format. It's hard to believe an answer if you don't understand the question it is addressing. The Q&A below is no *Summa Theologica*, but hopefully some of these reflections will answer questions that are important to you.

**Q. Is it a sin if we miss Sunday Mass if we have a valid reason like dangerous weather conditions or sick child at home?**

**A. This is a good and practical question that I'm sure many people deal with from time to time. So thanks for asking! I think the answer is very simple. And I think the best way to answer it is to first highlight the reason we are "obliged" to attend Sunday Mass and certain holy days.**

First of all, in our day and age, in the culture we live in, there is a tendency to dislike authority and being told what to do. We value our freedom. But sometimes we value it to the point of forgetting the role of legitimate authority in our lives. Parents know that kids, especially teenagers, dislike being told what to do and what the rules are. But this is an act of love and necessary. Similarly, God gave the Church, in the person of the pope in particular, the authority to oblige us to certain days of worship. But we should never forget this is a grace and a good thing! It's a way of knowing, with certainty, what God wants regarding our worship of Him at the Mass. So in exercising this authority the Church has bound us to worship at Mass on Sundays and certain holy days.

Again, this is a good thing and frees us from the burden of trying to figure it out all by ourselves. With that said, and with a proper understanding of the obligation to attend Mass those days then, yes, it's a sin to intentionally miss Mass through our own fault. It's an act of disobedience and also a disregard for the sacredness of the holy Mass. I realize this is hard to swallow for some and our defenses want to immediately go up sometimes when we are told what to do. But I'd want to lovingly challenge anyone feeling that way to realize this "obligation" really is an act of love from God and His Church.

Now to the heart of your question. What if it's bad weather or you have a sick child or something similar? I don't think there is any black and white answer to this other than to say God is a very reasonable God and would never impose upon us a burden that is unreasonable and too burdensome. So, to be direct, I do think there could be very legitimate reasons someone would miss Mass and it would be the right decision. The obvious example may be the elderly person who cannot drive very well in the midst of a snow storm. Is God going to be angry if this person is too afraid to brave the roads for fear of getting stuck or in an accident? I think not. Again, God is not unreasonable. And the sick child could be another legitimate example.

But be cautioned! Sometimes our tendency is to take advantage of the generosity of God. A good rule of thumb for missing Mass for a reasonable cause would be that you would not go out for any reason whatsoever! So, for example, if you decide to miss Mass because of snow but then go to the movies, or the store or McDonald's then we are the ones being unreasonable and are not being honest with the situation. Some also miss for reasons of inconvenience such as being on vacation. But, again, this is not a reasonable excuse barring impossibility.

The last point I'll make, which could so easily be missed, is that we should never forget that going to Mass is an incredible privilege! The obligation mentality is the minimalist approach. The truth is that we should work toward fostering a deep desire to attend Mass because we have discovered the great spiritual benefits of celebrating it and receiving our Lord in Holy Communion! If we can achieve this mind frame I think we will always know what to do.

## Feast Days and Memorials

### December 10: Second Sunday of Advent (Peace)

Advent Candles, shining brightly in the midst of darkness, are symbols that remind us of Jesus, who came as Light into our dark world. During this 2nd week of Advent, the "Candle of Peace" is lit. Let us we reflect on our lives and orient ourselves toward Christ's coming, preparing our hearts to receive Him anew.

**Colossians 3:15** - "Let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, since as members of one body you were called to peace."

**Prayer:** "Almighty God, you offer rest for our hearts, and peace for our souls."

### December 11: St Damasus, Pope, 306-384

Damasus was elected Pope when he was a sixty-year-old deacon. His reign was marked by violence because of a rival group that fought to overthrow him in favor of another candidate. Although his Papacy was marked by continued struggle, Pope Damasus left his mark with accomplishments that have lasted longer than his opponents. He was responsible for changing the liturgical language of the Church from Greek to Latin, and commissioned Saint Jerome to translate the Scriptures into Latin. He worked hard to preserve and restore the catacombs, the graves of the martyrs, and relics. He is also known for his epigrams (short sayings in verse) about martyrs and saints.

### December 12: Our Lady of Guadalupe

Patron of the Americas

On December 9, 1531, in Mexico, Our Lady appeared to Juan Diego, a humble Aztec Indian who had recently converted to the Catholic faith. She asked him to go to the Bishop to ask for a church to be built on Tepeyac Hill, and as proof that he had truly seen her, she instructed him to pick beautiful roses that were growing on the hill, despite the rocky ground and December cold. The image that we know as Our Lady of Guadalupe was imprinted on his cloak by the roses as he carried them to the Bishop. He became the first Roman Catholic indigenous saint from the Americas.

### December 13: St Lucy, Virgin and Martyr, 283-304

Patron of the blind and of eyesight

Lucia, whose name can mean "light" or "lucid," was a young Christian woman in the early 4th century who lived in Syracuse, a city on the Italian island of Sicily. She was martyred during the persecution of Christians under the reign of Diocletian. Refusing an arranged marriage with a pagan, Lucy prayed to St. Agatha to cure her mother's illness and persuade her to allow her daughter to commit her life to God. The rejected bridegroom reported to the governor that she was a Christian, and he ordered that she be tortured and executed.

### December 14: Memorial of St John of the Cross, Priest, 1542-1591

Patron of contemplatives, mystics and Spanish poets

Juan de Yepes y Alvarez was born in Avila, Spain. His father worked as an accountant for wealthy members of his family. When he married a poor woman from a lower class his family disowned him. When Juan was young, his father and older brother died and his mother worked as a weaver to support her family. Sent to a boarding school for poor children, Juan received a religious education and embraced the religious life from a young age. He joined the Carmelite Order and became an expert on the Bible. After meeting Teresa of Avila, who was known for leading a strict and simple life, John of the Cross desired to follow that regimen too. Caught up in a reform movement that erupted in violent disagreement among the Carmelites, he was persecuted and imprisoned for disobedience. It was while in prison that John of the Cross became an influential poet. He is also known for experiencing a vision and making a small drawing of what he saw: Christ on the Cross, looking down from above.
